

About the Artist

SCAD Museum of Art presents *I did it again*, an exhibition of four reconfigured installations by Italian multimedia artist Paola Pivi. She often employs a playfulness in her practice to explore darker themes. Pivi's work engages contemporary concerns and conditions, including the environment and navigating the world in a post-truth context. For her exhibition, Pivi uses the language of window displays as public art by creating vignettes within the SCAD Museum of Art Jewel Boxes, a series of glass enclosures located along the historic museum's northern façade.

I did it again features a series of Pivi's polar bear figures — life-sized, unnaturally and brightly hued sculptures clad in feathers. The polar bear has become a symbol of the perils of climate change — emaciated creatures stranded on flotillas of ice. As such, they are embedded with projected values, eliciting both empathy and endof-world hysteria. Pivi's bears are occupied with more mundane activities, including dancing, relaxing with their feet up behind a desk or climbing a wall. Their anthropomorphic qualities render them absurd, but also deepen their inherent pathos.

I did it again is organized by Storm Janse van Rensburg, head curator of SCAD exhibitions. The show received support from Galerie Perrotin New York, Paris, Hong Kong, Seoul, Tokyo, and is a reconfiguration of a project originally commissioned by Italian department store la Rinascente, Milan.

About the Curriculum Guide

SCAD curriculum guides provide learning opportunities that fulfill the requirements of national education standards and are designed for use within the museum's exhibition spaces and in classrooms. 1 Describe a character

"... there is something similar in all of us. When we make art, we can communicate on that level." Paola Pivi

As a part-time Alaska resident, Paola Pivi feels a special connection to polar bears. Pivi's bears are true-to-life in size and form. With her additions of dyed turkey feathers, poses and props, the bears develop into characters with anthropomorphic, or human-like, **traits**.



2 Create for a cause

Grades 3-5

"I was talking with my friend ... who told me that every human being has a memory of a past when we were very closely connected with animals.

Paola Pivi's polar bears celebrate a romantic, fanciful idea of nature. They also comment on serious environmental issues. Polar bear populations are **declining** due to rising temperatures and the loss of their icy hunting grounds, sending the bears into towns where they scavenge for food. Pivi calls attention to their loss of habitat by putting her bears in **domestic** settings. She comments on global warming by covering them in brilliant feathers that **resemble** those of tropical birds.


